09:30-10:15 Hooked On Music: Driving Public Engagement with Citizen Science John Ashley Burgoyne (Netherlands Institute for Sound and Vision, The Netherlands)

Dr John Ashley Burgoyne teaches quantitative methods in the University of Amsterdam's musicology programmes and conducts research as part of the Music Cognition Group at the Institute for Language, Logic, and Computation and the Research and Development division at the Netherlands Institute for Sound and Vision. Trained in musicology, computer science, and statistics, he is especially interested in how large data sets – or the potential for large data sets – can open musicological frontiers and foster collaborations academic and non-academic partners. Hooked!, his most recent project, is a citizen-science experiment on musical memory that has attracted more than 50 000 participants and may eventually lead to new therapies for dementia and other memory disorders.

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Prof. Lorna Hughes is the University of Wales Chair in Digital Collections, based in the National Library of Wales. Lorna leads a research programme based around the digital collections of the National Library of Wales, with a particular focus on understanding the use, value and impact of digital resources on research, teaching and public engagement. She is particularly interested in the use of ICT tools and methods for the analysis of largescale digital collections, and in research collaborations between humanities and scientific disciplines. She was President of the Association for Computing in the Humanities (2002-6), and is Secretary of the Alliance of Digital Humanities Organizations (ADHO). She is the managing and commissioning editor of the Ashgate series, 'Digital Research in the Arts and Humanities'.
